Stroke Clinic Aims at Prevention

A stroke two months ago nearly cost Keith Auman his life.

Auman, 56, of High Point, is on the road to recovery, though it will likely be about a year before he can return to work.

After being treated for three weeks at Forsyth Medical Center, part of Auman's rehabilitation effort brought him back Wednesday to the hospital's Stroke Bridge clinic. There, Auman is working on his balance and memory and regaining his strength.

"It's very frustrating to be where I am now because I'm used to being very athletic," Auman said. He said he had no symptoms before the stroke on April 3.

"My memory is tanked. I have to look up everything," Auman said.

"Yet, I'm hopeful that over time this clinic will help get me back to normal health and keep me from having to go through this ever again."

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The clinic and a similar effort at Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center represent a piece of the changing health care environment as hospitals nationwide transition to a preventive care model being driven by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

Medicare plans to provide lower payments to health care systems with rates worse than the national average for readmission and infection and other categories.

However, systems would receive higher Medicare payments for measurably improving and maintaining the health of the populations they serve.

Liz Sweeney, a health care analyst with Standard and Poor's, said the shift from a fee-for-service business model to one focused on preventive measures and reducing unnecessary care likely will bring fewer federal and state reimbursement dollars.

The Forsyth clinic aims to reduce the readmission rate of stroke patients through better communicating post-hospital treatment and medicinal regimens and connecting patients to primary physician care. It has assisted patients ranging in age from 26 to 98.

The Forsyth Stroke and Neurosciences Center, which oversees the clinic, said last week that the clinic has contributed to a reduction in 30-day readmission rates from

8.3 percent in 2010 to 2.6 percent in 2011 and 0.8 percent in the first quarter of 2012. The data measure only patients who are released to their home.

Forsyth discharged 335 stroke patients in the 10 months before the clinic opened in October 2010. It discharged 516 stroke patients from October 2010 through December 2011, and 13 required readmission in that period.

By comparison, a study published in Stroke magazine in 2010 found that 20 percent of patients discharged from U.S. hospitals after suffering an acute stroke either died or were readmitted within 30 days.

Another Forsyth program aimed at lowering readmissions of patients with heart failure has reduced the rate from 7.6 percent to less than 1 percent.

Auman said he felt normal when he went to bed the night before he suffered the stroke on April 3. His wife, Debi, recalled most of their recent experience because of voids in his memory. "He woke up with an excruciating headache, throwing up violently."

After going to High Point Regional Medical Center, he was diagnosed with bleeding in his brain and transferred to the neurosurgical unit at Forsyth.

"They said bacteria had gotten into his heart and moved to his brain, causing an

aneurysm," Debi Auman said. "After his surgery, he took a turn for the worse on Easter, and the doctors asked for the family to be brought in. "He survived a six-hour procedure and has been doing better since."

Keith Auman said he's been told by his doctors he stands a good chance of returning to his pre-stroke level of health "as long as I do what I'm told."

Chere Gregory, Forsyth's medical doctor for neurosciences, said heeding that advice is pivotal to stroke patients because there are avoidable scenarios that contribute to readmission:


- incomplete instructions for their post-hospital care requirements;
- patients and support people not understanding instructions;
- not making necessary changes in the home to accommodate the limited mobility of a recovering stroke patient; and
- high cost of medication.

"It's frightening enough having to go to the hospital with a stroke," Gregory said. "Having to go back within 30 days of being sent home can be even more frightening.

"A sizable part of our adult population understands instructions verbally much better than they do those that are written down."

The stroke center at Wake Forest Baptist began its readmission-prevention program in September. Its goals are similar to those at Forsyth. Wake Forest Baptist also has programs for reducing readmissions for heart failure, pneumonia and heart attacks.

"The readmission rate for stroke patients, like many conditions, is directly related to socio-economic factors," said Dr. Cheryl Bushnell, director of the Wake Forest Baptist stroke center. "Those patients who have access to health insurance and can better afford care tend to do better. One of our goals is to bridge gaps to help provide everyone with access to care."
