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


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History of Old Union UMC Trivia Question

Early Methodist Conversion

Freeborn Garrettson, who eventually became a prominent Methodist preacher, recounts his conversion in the 1770s. Like many early Methodists, his conversion was not from a completely unchurched background but from a kind of religiosity that failed to satisfy. The long nature of Garrettson's conversion, with its many significant milestones and a climactic experience in private, was also common.

I was born in the year of our Lord 1752. My parents were of the Church of England and brought up their children in that way. My father was a very moral man and thought by his neighbors to be a very good Christian, and my mother was a woman who feared the Lord. I was from infancy prone to pride, self-will, and stubborn-ness, which I afterward felt to the sorrow of my heart. Very early I was taught the Lord's Prayer, Creed, Ten Commandments, and the Catechism and was restrained by my tender parents from open sin....

We lived in a very gloomy day [with] no preached Gospel, only a moral sermon read in the Church on the Lord's day, and very little of the new birth known or spoken of in the parish. One day when I was about nine years of age, as

I was walking all alone in the field, it was as sensibly pressed on my sensitive powers, as if I had heard a voice saying, "Ask and it shall be given you, etc." I was immediately drawn out in thought to know what it meant, and it was pressed on my mind that it was a token for good, and a spirit of joy sprang up within me.

Shortly after, I was by myself, and there seemed to be a question asked me, "Do you know what a saint is?" I paused awhile and then answered to myself, "There are no saints on earth in this our day." The same voice seemed to reply, "A saint is one that is wholly given up to God." Immediately an idea, I saw such a person, the most beautiful, I thought, that ever my eyes beheld. I was much affected and wished to be a saint, and it was pressed on my mind that I should be one. And a sprit of joy sprang up within me, but I had no one to open the way of salvation to me.

Sometime after this a great affliction came on my father's family: a sister, then my mother, [and] after them, tow servants were removed from time to eternity. The ninth day of my sister's illness she asked for some victuals [i.e., food] and, after she had eaten a little, desired to be raised up in the bed. "I am going," said she, "to leave the world and wish to bid you all farewell." The family was soon gathered in the room, and all were bathed in tears. "Weep not," said she, "for me for I am going to Jesus, who will do far more for me than any of you

can." She spoke as one from the dead, and I believe the exhortation will never be forgotten. When almost spent, she desired to be laid down and, within a few minutes, left the world with a smiling countenance. I do believe [that] according to her knowledge she feared the Lord from her youth up, and it was in the nineteenth year of her age when she was taken away. O! what I felt! A melancholy gloom hung over me for a long time. I frequently withdrew into secret places, and wept bitterly but knew not what I wanted. Had gospel light shone in that day as it does now, I might [have] had a better chance to have known the way of salvation

In my eighteenth year I now particularly began to think of living in the world. [It was a] Melancholy consideration [since] I was dead to God and my own eternal welfare. I did by no means run into scandalous company or crimes, but I was a pleasure taker and a lover of this world more than God. O! What a reason I have to be thankful to God for his restraining grace which gave me a dislike to many of the practice which where prevalent among many of the youth of my age.

About this time it was, that there was a great talk of the people called Methodists in Baltimore County where I lived. Many went out to hear them, and among the Methodists I went to hear Mr. Strawbridge and Mr. Williams, but the place was so crowded that I could not hear with any satisfaction. But from what I could understand I thought they preached the truth, and I did not dare join with the multitude to speak evil of them but thought that I would let them alone and keep close to my own church. O! Those soul damning sins, pride, and unbelief, kept me from God and his people....

As my good and gracious God did not will my damnation, his Spirit still strove with me. One day as I past over a rapid stream, the log on which I had frequently past gave way, and I stood a near chance of being swept down the stream. After struggling a while, I got out much wounded among the rocks, it came to me with power: "what would have become of your soul had you been drowned?" I wept bitterly and prayed to the Lord and made many promises. But O! My stubborn heart was unwilling to submit....

I head heard as yet but two or three Methodist sermons, and the devil strove to keep me away. I heard Mr. Pilmore and thought he preached the truth and had a smooth pleasant voice, but it seemed to have no effect on my mind. Again, I went to Richard Webster's to hear my (since) well-tired friend and brother, [Francis] Asbury. He began his sermon about sunset, and I can truly say that his doctrine was a salved to a festering wound. I sat by the door bathed in tears the whole time and heard the sermon with great delight. As night came on I was convinced that he did not read his sermon and was much surprised to hear such fluency of speech in an extempore way. I supposed hundreds of thoughts past my mind but I returned home with gladness of heard, fully satisfied that he was a servant of God....

About this time [mid-1770s] it was that I became more particularly acquainted with our new parish minister, who was a very upright man in his outward deportment, and must set by in the parish [i.e., he was well regarded by the parish], and he had a great zeal for the truth in his preaching as far as he had knowledge. I believe he was instrumental in keeping me for God and his people for I was a constant attendant on his ministry and began to think



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that the doctrine which he inculcated would do very will. And the more I fell in with his plan for salvation the less I thought of the Methodists. Having an opportunity of several conversations with him on the subject, he told me that the Methodists carried the matter too far [and] that there was no such thing as for a man to know his sins forgiven and that all we could expect in this world was a hope, and that this hope was from an upright life and a trust in God. Those advices were as kindling to my nature, and it was not long before I corroborated with him in sentiment, concluding that I was a Christina and pled that it was impossible for any man to know his sins forgiven.

I became so bigotly attached to the church that I thought it sinful to go b it to hear the Methodists, although I frequently went to hear them after the service of the church was over and likewise on weekdays. At the former we had a smooth, moral sermon read, which did not disturb the consciences of any; at the latter the law was thundered down on the hearers and the plan of salvation pointed out. During the time of my self-security state, I had the form of godliness and would not willingly or knowingly do anything which I thought to be sinful and was very strict with respect to private prayer, fasting, keeping the Sabbath. And I read much and for a considerable time was under consideration about a literary qualification for the ministry in the church way and frequently consulted my new counselor. I thought that I was a good Christian but at times I had doubts, especially under the preaching of the Methodists. Many are the times that my poor foundation has shaken under the preaching of Brother Shadford in so much that it would be a considerable time before I could get all things to go con clearly with me again. And think I would be ready to conclude that I would hear the Methodists no more. But still I was drawn to hear again. I stood as it were between the people of God and the world and at times had hard struggles.

One day, being a distance from home, I met with a zealous Methodist exhorter. He asked me if I was born again. I told that I had a hope that I was. "Do you," said he, "know that your sins are forgiven?" "I do not," said I, "neither do I believe that there is such a knowledge to be had in this world." "I perceive," said he, "that you are in the way to hell, and be ye well assured, that if you die in that state, you will be damned." Said I, "our blessed Lord says, 'Judge not, etc.' What did you ever see, or know of my life," said I, "to cause you to denounce me in that manner?" I pitied and turned my back on him. The words of that zealous young man did not soon leave me, for the Spirit of the Lord strove with me, and something within frequently told me "all is not well with you."

On this self-righteous way I continued until June 1775. O! My dear Lord, I never shall forget the blessed morning.... Just as I awoke I was alarmed by an awful voice. It was as powerfully impressed on my eternal powers as if it had been a human voice in thunder: "You are not prepared to die." Conviction was thundered down upon my poor, guilty soul, and all my fig leaves were torn away. Immediately I started from my pillow and cried out, "Lord, have mercy on my soul." As it was about the commencement of the late, unhappy war, and as there was to be a general review that day near my house, I had promised myself much happiness at it, as I was a professed friend to the American cause. But, instead of giving my attendance there, I past away the day in solitude and in the evening I went to hear Brother Ruff preach. In deep distress I went, and in deep distress I returned but let no one know my case. I was sorely tempted of the devil and was ready to conclude that I had withstood so many calls that the Lord would not be gracious to my soul. I fasted, prayed and cried to God in secret places but received no answer. I carried my burden day after day but opened my case to none but the Lord.

On Whitmonday [the Monday after Pentecost] 1775 in the evening I went to hear Br. Ruff preach again, and it was in my return home that I lost my burden. After preaching was over, I called in at Mr. G-n's where I stayed until near 9 o'clock and then set out on my way home. I had not rode a mile until I was so oppressed that I was constrained to light from my horse and humble myself on my knees before the Lord in a solitary wood, where no mortal eye could see or ear hear me. And my poor distressed soul was in an agony. I cannot convey to anyone the tenth part of what I felt.

While I was on my knees before the Lord, I sensibly felt two spirits with me: the blessed spirit on the right and the evil spirit on the left. The good spirit set forth to my inmost mind, the beauties of religion so that it appeared as if I was almost ready to lay hold on Christ by faith. O! Unbelief, that damning sin, kept me from my dear Savior. The devil on the other hand would rise up and dress religion in as deformed a part as possible, telling me, that if I did not forsake that way, I could not carry on my business, and that I should be ruined, etc, the temptations of the devil were so powerful that the y might with propriety be compared to a sweeping rain, I was a long time in this posture and in deep exercises until at length I began to reason with the devil and he overpowered me, and my tears and groans were soon gone. But I continued on my knees looking towards heaven in a kind of meditating way an sensibly felt the two spirits with me.

After waiting on my knees a considerable time, very powerfully tempted, I broke out thus, "Lord, spare me one year more and let me live as I have done, and then I will serve thee." The answer was "Now is the accepted time." I then pled for six months but it was not granted. Three months, the answer was no. One month, I was denied. Two weeks, still the answer was no. The carnal knows nothing of this, but it was as perceptible as if I had been conversing with a person face to face. O! How high the carnal mind did rise. The enemy of my soul broke in upon me in a powerful manner. "You see," said he, "that the God whom you have been attempting to serve is a hard master. I would have you give up his service and pray to him no more." O! Wretch, wretch that I was. I immediately arose from my knees with these thoughts in my heart. I know not but that I



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uttered words: "I will take my own time for it, and when it suits me, then I will be religious."

O! What a good God I had to deal with. Had he sent me to [be] killed it would have been just what I deserved. I got on my house and was making towards home with a heart as hard as a stone. But I had not rode a quarter of a mile before the Lord met me with these words, "These three years I have come seeking fruit on this fig tree and find none." Then the following words were added: "I have come once more to make you an offer of salvation and it is the last time. Choose or refuse."

I verily did believe that, if I rejected that offer, mercy would be clean gone forever. Heaven and hell were disclosed to my interior eye, and life and death were set before me. I was surrounded as it were by a divine power and shaken over hell. I saw clearly that pride and unbelief had kept me from God. It was like giving up the ghost. I was perfectly reconciled with the justice of God for I never could before now be reconciled to that attribute. I threw down my bridle on my horse's neck and lifted my hands and eyes to heaven an cried out, "Lord, I submit, make me as thou wouldest have me to be." I know the moment when every false prop was taken away, and I reconciled to the plan of salvation by Jesus Christ. I could look up and see by an eye of faith the great Jehovah reconciled through Jesus Christ to my poor soul. This power was attended with peace and joy in so much that I

seemed to be all taken up with Jesus, and although all alone in a solitary wood, in the dead time of night, I could but lift up my voice and praise God aloud so that I might have been heard a far off. Now it was that I saw the way of salvation and knew that my sins were forgiven.
