From Pastor Ed

Just recently Jason Lyons and Mike Craven mowed the yards at both the parsonage and at Burnetts Chapel. I know that I can't speak for you, but I love the smell that fills the air following that first mowing of the year. Not only are the flowers, bushes, and trees experiencing resurrection, but couple that with the smell of wild onions and you know that Spring is here. This past Winter season has been long and cold! We've experienced the sting of low temps, coupled with ice and freezing rain several times. We had a few bouts with snow the last of which was a beautiful snowfall that clung to everything it came in contact with. However, as excited as many of us are when area meteorologists are calling for inclement weather along with the possibilities of area schools altering their schedules, how wonderful and refreshing it is to greet warmer and longer days that provide us with the opportunity to get way beyond the doors of our homes and enjoy outdoor activities.

In an analogous manner, the changing of the seasons remind me somewhat of the Lenten season and it's focus on the fruition of Jesus' mission here on earth. Many times the challenges of life including everything from A-Z endeavors to entomb us. Lives ordained by God for greatness and His glory become paralyzed as the tentacles of fear and grief wrap themselves tightly around us. As this lifestyle continues, layer upon layer builds thus adding thickness to the walls that hold captive it's prey. When you and I allow God to roll away the stone that holds us captive, it is then that light breaks forth thus chasing away the darkness that for way too long has held us prey. Embracing the truth that light brings forth life, allowing God to break the chains that hold us captive makes possible for us to experience all of life as God ordains it. The stench of captivity that once permeated the walls of our boundaries is replaced with each and every blessing God's Divine plan and purpose provides. Cold hearts are made warm as transformation and, in time, sanctification, has a chance to take root. No longer do we settle for the same old same old that for many years we thought was the "norm." When we walk from the confines of our tomb, little by little we experience new territory and it is in that landscape that we discover new life and new opportunities.

Empowered by the strength of His heavenly Father, Jesus came "to love, heal, and forgive" which gives us the chance to know more intimately the love God has for us. It is my prayer that each one of you would come to know the freshness of God's amazing grace not only at Easter but in each moment of your life. I end my thoughts with verse two of Kurt Kaiser's hymn entitled "Pass It On." "What a wondrous time is spring, when all the trees are budding; the birds begin to sing, the flowers start their blooming. That's how it is with God's love once you've experienced it; you want to sing, it's fresh like spring, you want to pass it on."
