#### From Pastor Ed

Most, if not all of us can remember those times in our lives when something totally unexpected happened. Those moments can bring times of great anxiety or they can take us to new heights where previously we hadn't traveled. Following those times of scaling the emotional mountains we experience or plummeting downward with everything crammed in between; the question then becomes---what now? When the extraordinary settles into the rhythm and rhyme of the ordinary, how do we handle life from day to day? I think it goes without saying that those moments in our lives work to transform us in many ways. As we are walking through these days of Easter, I think of those first century followers of Jesus Christ and the roller coaster ride of emotions that must have flooded their entire being following Jesus' resurrection from the dead. For three years Jesus' inner class of twelve had followed him listening intently to their Master Instructor as Jesus taught them about His heavenly Dad and the reasons for which he had been commissioned to come to Earth to reveal God's eternal plan for salvation. Toward the end of Jesus' life, it became very clear that those who made up our Lord's classroom (and many more) had not a clue about the core lesson plan he was sharing with them.

And then, tragedy struck. The voice that had called them from their daily labors to come and follow this Evangelist had been executed by way of capitol punishment at the hands of the Roman government. The only disciple who stayed by Jesus' side and as well his mother and the other women who accompanied her was John. Following his death, he was placed in a borrowed tomb and as far as everyone were concerned, that was that. The hope upon which their future hinged was gone! And then, it happened. Something totally unexpected took

place. Reports started coming their way that these same woman who had ventured out to the tomb of Jesus to finish the task of embalming his body was gone! How could this be? And then, on that same day, shocked men locked away behind closed doors witnessed first hand their Teacher alive and well as he stood before them and said-"Peace be with you." In the days that ensued, Jesus' previous teachings would become crystal clear to his students. As apostles, these men (and the women as well) understood the scope of his teachings and the implications contained for humanity. Before Jesus' ascension, he assured those closest to him that upon his return to his Farther in heaven, he would not leave them abandoned. He would send the Comforter (His Holy Spirit) to lead and guide them throughout their lives.

Again, the question at hand, what now? The task before these disciples transformed into apostles would soon be made known to them. As the Apostle Paul would (in time) come and join in the ranks with the followers of Jesus, the arduous task of building the early church was before them. Pentecost would bring about a miraculous power among the people. Peter would preach two sermons scanning two days the end result of which was more than seven thousand people coming forward to serve the church of which this same resurrected Jesus was and is the Head. And after more than two thousand years, that same movement is still going forward. You and I now take our place among those working to build the church of today built upon those same biblical principles. Regardless of the unexpected things that come our way and the effect they may have upon our lives, then as now you and I are God's Easter people, a people of the Book, endeavoring to lay block upon block building the Kingdom of God. With all the distractions this world tosses our way, we must remember that paramount in our lives is the opportunity and weighty responsibility of wearing the same stole of servitude that the early sojourners of faith wore. May we all take seriously God's call upon our lives and work together to carry on

# Top Ten List...with thoughts to ponder by RVDRNANA

At the close of this appointment season I feel led to share with you some of the most requested characteristics church Pastor Parish Relations Committees share with me during our consultations, and my reflections upon those characteristics. At the heart of most conversations is the deep and good desire of most churches to be effective, to reach new people for Jesus, and to have a future for their grandchildren. But getting to those goals presents great challenges only the power of God's Holy Spirit joining with our obedience can meet.

Use these as conversation starters in your churches. Together, prayerfully, we can move closer to being the communities of faith God desires of us.

10. We want to overcome our financial decline and have enough money to meet our obligations and help other people. (But we refuse to have an emphasis on Biblical Stewardship and ask our people to make first fruit commitments of their financial gifts to the church even though it is a proven fact that churches who do that receive more money and

meet their financial obligations).

- 9. We want our new pastor to bring in new people to our church and be active participants. (But we have no evangelism strategy for reaching out to our neighbors or helping new people feel welcomed among us. We don't even know the people who live around our church).
- 8. We want a pastor who is a strong preacher who preaches Biblically based sermons. (But we are too busy to attend Bible Studies or do our own daily devotions so we can only guess if the preacher is actually preaching from the Bible).
- 7. We need more young families to join our church. We miss having children among us. (But we won't volunteer to keep the nursery because we did that when we were young and now it's someone else's turn. We haven't updated our nursery rooms in twenty years).
- 6. We want our new pastor to be a strong leader and lead our church to grow. (But we regularly vote, "no," on any new ideas because we don't like change).
- 5. We want a young pastor with a family so they will attract other young families to our church. (But it bothers us when the pastor's children are disruptive in the worship service. We like the peace and quiet of our sanctuary).
- 4. We want a pastor who can relate well with our teenagers and be a role model for them. (But we don't have the time to volunteer to help with our youth ministry. Some of us are only in church once or twice a month. We don't even know the names of our youth).
- 3. We want our pastor to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ throughout our community. (But we have not learned how to share our own faith stories with others and are afraid to do so).
- 2. We raised our children here and now they have moved away or choose not to attend. We are worried about our future. (But we forgot to fall in love with other's peoples' children who have lived all around our church and we were so focused on ourselves we didn't see them...even now we still don't see them).
